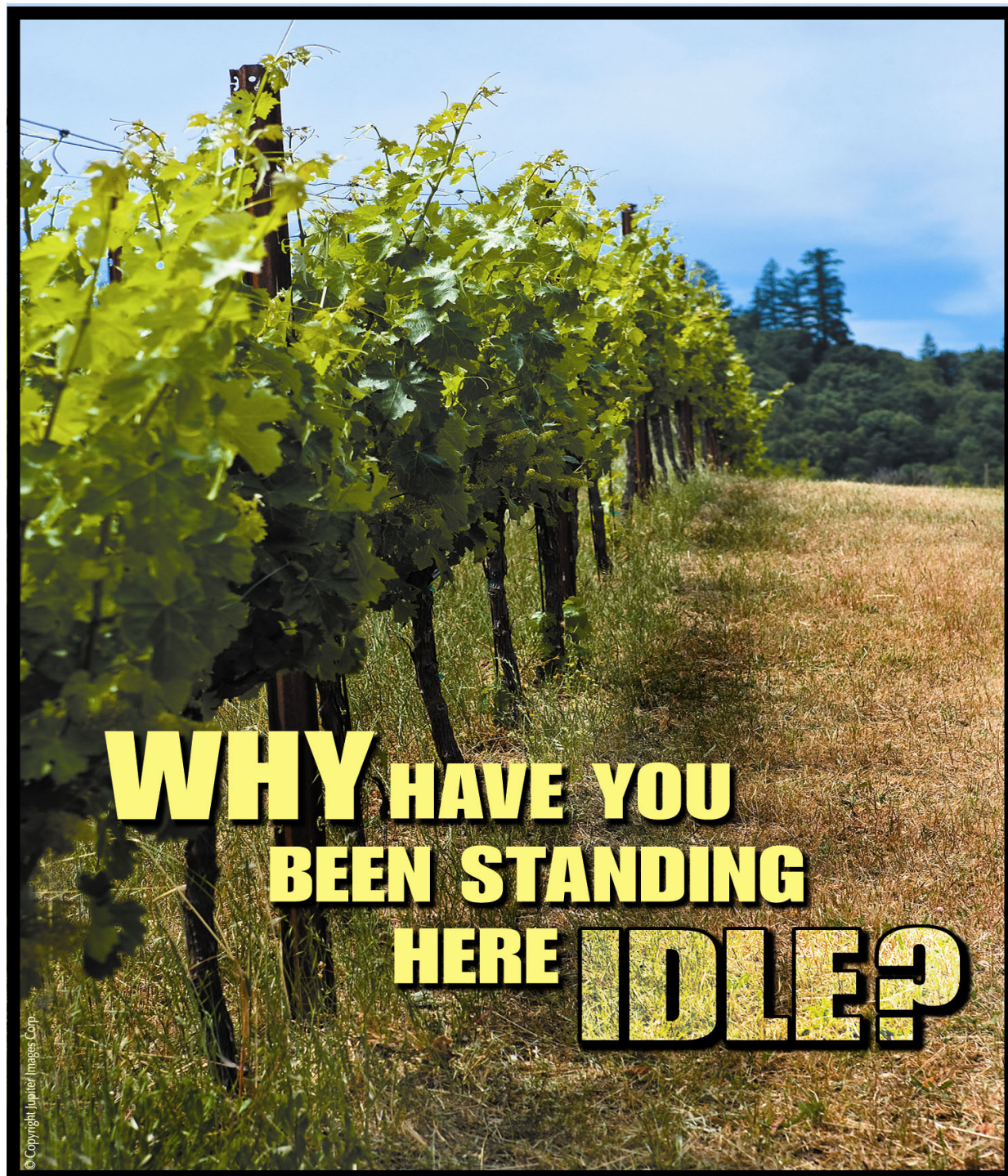

Reflections From the Pastor

“The Church, therefore, exhorts her members, that through dialogue and collaboration with other religions...they recognize, preserve and promote the good things, spiritual and moral, as well as the socio-cultural values found among these persons.”

Nostra Aetate (Vatican II: October 28, 1965)

Among the important documents to come from the Second Vatican Council is a rather short one that addresses the relationship of the Catholic Church to non-Christian religions – **Nostra Aetate**. Although the document is brief, it is of great importance, marking in many ways a true change of heart on the part of the Catholic Church and its view of non-Christian religions.

One has only to recall that less than a hundred years before the Second Vatican Council, a common religious practice on Good Friday in Rome was to look for Jews and beat them! After all, they were the “*Christ killers*”. Knowing such a history, one can well appreciate how profoundly moving was the visit by Pope John Paul II to the only synagogue located in Rome across the Tiber from the Vatican. For both the Jews and the Pope it was a time to remember, to mourn, to beg forgiveness and to be reconciled in the God of Abraham, Moses and the prophets.

I still remember vividly the visit of John Paul II to the museum of the Holocaust in Jerusalem commemorating the *Shoah*. For the pope it was much more than a ceremonial visit. Many of his closest friends, playmates from childhood, fell victim to the Holocaust. Often as a boy if the local Jewish soccer team was short a player young Karol would fill in.

Nostra Aetate quotes the words of Paul regarding the Jews in his ***Letter to the Romans*** (9:4-5): “*theirs is the sonship and the glory and the covenants and the law and the worship and the promises: theirs are the fathers and from them is the Christ according to the flesh*”. In the spirit of Paul it was recently officially acknowledged by Benedict XVI that our Jewish brothers and sisters come to redemption through the covenants made with Abraham and Moses.

It is also worth considering the Council’s approach to our Muslim brothers and sisters: “***The Church regards with esteem the Moslems...though they do not acknowledge Jesus as God, they revere Him as a prophet. They also honor Mary.***” I suspect many Christians would be surprised to read how the **Koran** speaks of Jesus and of Mary. In fact, there is more written about Mary in the **Koran** than in the New Testament! There are in fact two scenes of the Annunciation found in the **Koran**. The holy book of Mohammed calls Muslims to cultivate devotion to Mary.

As we have just marked the 10th anniversary of 9/11, I would like to encourage parishioners to take time to read prayerfully **Nostra Aetate** that can be easily downloaded off the internet. A tragic possible consequence of 9/11 is to place blame with our Muslim brothers and sisters. Words such as *jihad* or *Crusade* conjure painful memories of violence done in the name of God against others, I am reminded of St. Francis of Assisi and his opposition to the Crusades. While Crusaders in the name of Christ were busy slaughtering Muslims, Francis came to the Muslims not to do violence, but rather to share with them the love of Christ. Because of his courage and love Franciscans were made by the Muslim leaders, the guardians of all places in the Holy Land held sacred by Christians. It is recalling this special relationship of Francis to the Muslim that Pope John Paul II invited religious leaders – Christian and non-Christian – to gather with him in Assisi to pray for world peace.

"La Iglesia, por lo tanto, exhorta a sus miembros, que a través del diálogo y la colaboración con otras religiones ... reconozcan, guarden y promuevan aquellos bienes espirituales y morales, así como la valores socio-culturales que en ellos existen personas ".
Nostra Aetate (Vaticano II: 28 de octubre de 1965)

Entre los documentos importantes que vienen del Concilio Vaticano II, es más bien corto que aborda la relación de la Iglesia Católica a las religiones no cristianas - Nostra Aetate. Aunque el documento es breve, es de gran importancia, que marca en muchos aspectos, un verdadero cambio de corazón por parte de la Iglesia Católica y su visión de las religiones no cristianas.

Uno sólo tiene que recordar que a menos de cien años antes del Concilio Vaticano II, una práctica religiosa común en el Viernes Santo en Roma fue en busca de Judíos y los golpearon! Después de todo, ellos eran los "asesinos de Cristo". Conocer una historia, un bien se puede apreciar lo profundamente conmovedor fue la visita del Papa Juan Pablo II a la única sinagoga en Roma en el Tíber del Vaticano. Tanto para los Judíos y el Papa era un momento para recordar, para llorar, pedir perdón y reconciliarse en el Dios de Abraham, Moisés y los profetas.

Todavía recuerdo vívidamente la visita de Juan Pablo II para el museo del Holocausto en Jerusalén para conmemorar la Shoah. Para el Papa fue mucho más que una visita ceremonial. Muchos de sus más cercanos amigos, compañeros de la infancia, fue víctima del Holocausto. A menudo como un niño si el equipo local de fútbol judío fue corta un jugador joven Karol sería llenar pulg

Nostra Aetate cita las palabras de Pablo con respecto a los Judíos en su carta a los Romanos (9,4-5): "quienes pertenecen la adopción y la gloria, los pactos y los Klaw y el culto y las promesas: ellos son los padres y de ellos es el Cristo según la carne ". En el espíritu de Pablo fue recientemente reconocido oficialmente por el Papa Benedicto XVI de que nuestros hermanos y hermanas judíos vienen a la redención a través de los pactos hechos con Abraham y Moisés.

También vale la pena teniendo en cuenta el enfoque del Consejo a nuestros hermanos y hermanas musulmanes: "La Iglesia mira también con aprecio a los musulmanes ... a pesar de que no reconocen a Jesús como Dios, veneran como profeta. Honran a María. "Sospecho que muchos cristianos se sorprendieron al leer cómo el Corán habla de Jesús y de María. De hecho, hay más escrito sobre María en el Corán que en el Nuevo Testamento! De hecho, hay dos escenas de la Anunciación en el Corán. El libro sagrado de Mahoma llama a los musulmanes a cultivar la devoción a María.

Como acabamos marcó el 10 ° aniversario del 9 / 11, me gustaría animar a los feligreses a tomar tiempo para leer Nostra Aetate oración que puede ser fácilmente descargado de la internet. Una trágica consecuencia posible de 9 / 11 es para culpar a nuestros hermanos y hermanas musulmanes. Palabras como jihad o cruzada evocan recuerdos dolorosos de la violencia hecha en nombre de Dios en contra de otros, me acuerdo de San Francisco de Asís y su oposición a las Cruzadas. Mientras los cruzados en el nombre de Cristo estaban ocupados sacrificio los musulmanes, Francis llegó a los musulmanes a no hacer violencia, sino para compartir con ellos el amor de Cristo. Debido a su valentía y amor franciscanos fueron hechas por los líderes musulmanes, los guardianes de todos los lugares en la Tierra Santa, lugar sagrado para los cristianos. Hay que recordar que esta relación especial de Francisco a los musulmanes que el Papa Juan Pablo II invitó a los líderes religiosos - cristianos y no cristianos - para reunirse con él en Asís para orar por la paz mundial.

LET'S PLAY FAIR!!

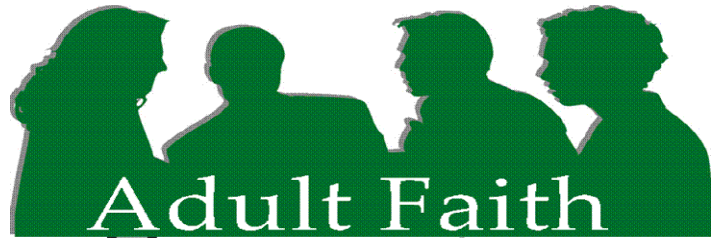
When our children were young, I often heard -- "THAT'S NOT FAIR!" And my response was automatic, "Life isn't fair. . ." The "THAT'S NOT FAIR!" heard in families is often from the older children about the better treatment of the younger, as in "They get more than we ever got when we were their age!" However to be perfectly honest, in different circumstances, I have caught myself thinking similarly i.e. it isn't fair, as in, "sure, they have the right connections" or "they have plenty of. . ." (fill in the blank).

Our American sense of justice and fair play have a hard time with this story of Jesus in today's Gospel. The landowner in this story went out at dawn, 9:00, noon, 3:00 and 5:00 and paid them all the same wage. It isn't fair to get the same amount after working all day as those who worked for an hour, is it??

In today's tough times we can relate to the laborers in this story who were hired later in the day, as we see too many (perhaps family/friends/neighbors) who "stand around idle all day" because "no one has hired them". Idleness isn't always a choice, and not a pleasant or relaxing experience for those needing and wanting to work. Those "who stand around idle" are often not in charge or in control.

We see in the Gospels that it's the lame, the poor, the blind, the prostitutes, the drunkards, the tax collectors, the sinners, the outsiders, the foreigners, etc. who tend to follow Jesus. It is those on the inside and the top who crucify him. Shouldn't that tell us something really important about perspective? Every viewpoint is a view from a point, and we need to critique that perspective if we are to see truth. After Christianity became the established religion of the Roman Empire, we largely stopped reading the Bible from the side of the poor and oppressed." (Fr. Richard Rohr)

Perhaps this Gospel is calling us to change our viewpoint. . .

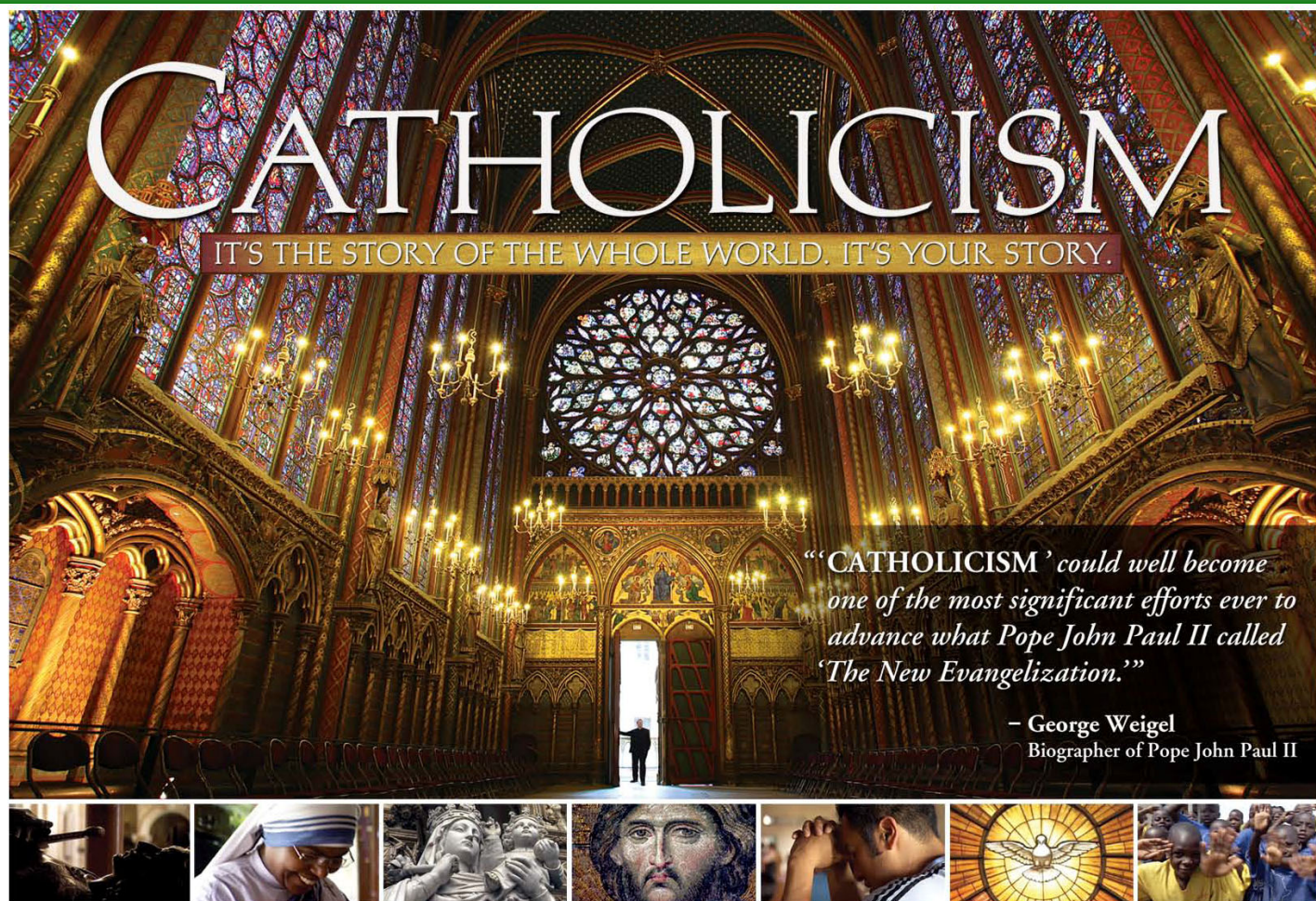


Legion of Mary

Attention High School Teens

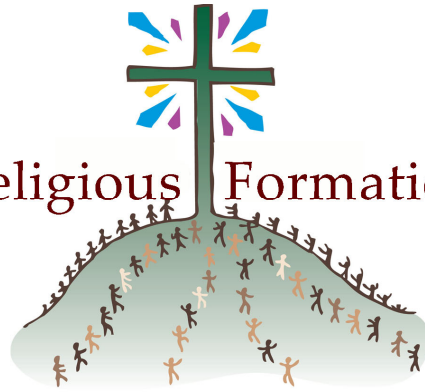
KICK-OFF GATHERING TONIGHT !
